MACARTHUR SOUTH – GOING FOR GOLD

Via the University of South Florida's Florida Positive Behavior Support (PBS) Program, Miami MacArthur South was the only school in the Miami-Dade County Public Schools to receive the award of gold model for their PBS program! Miami MacArthur South is an alternative disciplinary school for students in grades 6th-12th. Students are assigned to Miami MacArthur South following serious violations of the student code of conduct. Miami MacArthur South services a diverse demographic population that spans the southern half of the county. Given the behavioral challenges faced by many of our students, implementation of a consistent and effective behavior modification system is paramount to our success.

The recognition of Gold Model status was awarded to Miami MacArthur South due to our outstanding Positive Behavior Support program which entails: use of yearly outcome data indicative of significant behavioral gains, incorporation of data-based problem solving strategies to sustain and implement positive behavioral approaches to addressing discipline, and increase in parent awareness as well as community involvement. The foundation of our PBS program is built on the premise that behavior can be altered more effectively by rewarding desired behaviors rather than by punishing undesirable behaviors. Thus, students at our school earn points on a daily basis for demonstrating behavioral expectations such as arriving on time, using appropriate language, showing respect, completing assignments, etc. Much like a token economy system, points can yield tangible rewards such as participation in various weekly, fun activities. Perhaps the most amazing component of our PBS program is our students' response to it! Despite all the personal, behavioral, and even legal challenges that many of our students' face, the majority of our students are readily engaged in the PBS program and truly enjoy earning points and being able to participate in rewarding activities. As B.F. Skinner stated, "Properly used, positive reinforcement is extremely powerful."

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I.B. PESKOE K-8 CENTER STUDENTS GIVING BACK

The 6th and 8th grade students participating in the E/BD program at Irving and Beatrice Peskoe K-8 Center decided they wanted to do something different and fun at the beginning of this school year. During their weekly

group counseling sessions, the students tossed around several ideas. Finally, unsure how all the details would work out, the students agreed that they wanted to volunteer in some way. We approached Mrs. Amy Kussner, Speech and Language Pathologist, from the Pre-K Speech and Language Impaired program at Peskoe with our idea. Even though our idea was not completely thought out, without hesitation, she agreed to work together with us.

Within a week of discussing it with Mrs. Kussner, the students in the E/BD program began volunteering every Friday morning for 1 hour. During this time, the volunteers, referred to as "Big Buddies," worked diligently in helping the Pre-K students increase their verbal and socialization skills through various planned activities. They spent their time reading together, working on learning activities, playing, creating arts and crafts, singing, and more. Every week the "Big Buddies" led or modeled the activity.

As the year is coming to an end, both Mrs. Kussner and I have seen the growth both groups of students have made. My students have learned about compassion and giving. Mrs. Kussner's

students have increased their verbal communication, are less shy and are more motivated to learn. A Pre-K student who is a selective mute is now saying words and seeking out the friendship of an 8th grade "buddy" who missed over 30 days of school last year. What started as merely a fun project has become a rewarding experience that could have never been created in a traditional group counseling session.

The students and I are very thankful to Mrs. Kussner, Mrs. Rodriguez, paraprofessional, and all of the students in the Pre-K Speech and Language Impaired program for the wonderful memories. We are very grateful to have shared such great times with them!

If they were comfortable, we took turns reading aloud. This year, I had the wonderful experience of seeing one of my students improve his reading fluency significantly. His grades also improved. I encourage all of my colleagues to get a copy of Jim Trelease's wonderful book, <u>The Read Aloud Handbook</u>, and read aloud!

PALMETTO MIDDLE – STUDENTS "FLOCK" TO IN-HOUSE FIELD TRIP

Mrs. Alex Burdett of Art Thyme in The Falls shopping center provided the entire 6th graders participating in the E/BD program with a creative clay experience in the Art Therapy Room at Palmetto Middle. I had been working with the PTSA beginning in August to secure funds for this event. The president of the PTSA, Linda Dwyer, with PTSA's support, provided \$200 and Mrs. Burdett absorbed the difference so each student would be able to participate.

Mrs. Burdett brought all the materials needed for each step of the process to create "Owls". The students sat in groups of 4 and 5, and although they did not have to share materials, definitely inspired each other with their creative ideas. The approach to creating the Owl form was sequential and each step in the process had a separate directive that involved using a specific tool. As one can see, each "Owl" is unique and individual to each student artist. After ninety minutes the students were ready to apply paint to the still wet Owls to define and enhance their Owl's unique character. Mrs. Burdett then had each student write their name on a strip of paper that was secured to each Owl, which were taken with her to be fired at the Art Thyme studio.

Mrs. Burdett's organizational skills were discussed as part of a "teachable moment". The students were very impressed that everything they needed for the process, except the "kitchen" sink, was brought to classroom and organized with a great deal of thought and care. Due to how well everything was organized, clean up went smoothly with each student able to assist. The event ended with school lunches brought to the students for a communal lunch in the art therapy room!

The Thursday before winter vacation, Mrs. Burdett returned with the fired "Owls" individually wrapped and labeled with the same strip of paper attached to each student's Owl.

ORCHARD VILLA ELEMENTARY- PBS COACH'S CORNER

As an inner-city school located within a poverty-stricken demographic, we have many students who are not motivated to do much academically and struggle daily with behavior, as well. It is safe to say that our staff understands the issues and challenges that our children bring to school daily and are always willing to discover additional methods to go above and beyond to accommodate them. As such, the faculty and staff wanted to find a means of reaching these students and wanted to further utilize the PBS program to target ideas. We believe we have found both an answer and niche in an unlikely place during a visit from one of our community partners, Odebrecht U.S.A.

The Odebrecht team often visits the school throughout the year and presents several classroom handson experiences for teachers and students alike. These presentations give students a feel for what it's like to take part in construction projects such as the American Airlines Arena and the Miami International Airport, to name a few. One of our least motivated students just so happened to be present on one of their visiting days, and to his teachers' and classmates' amazement, his "light-bulb" went off. He charmed the Odebrecht staff and took the lead in topic discussions and answering questions. We all looked on, stunned, as he had never really participated in any classes prior to then. It turns out he knew more than what many would have ever thought in the field of engineering and construction. We, as a staff, took notice of his newly found motivation and wondered what type of atmosphere we could create if all students were given similar opportunities in their special areas of interest.

As we presented the idea to teachers who had previously revealed other talents, some agreed to volunteer and share their gifts in hopes of helping change behaviors in other troubled students as well. To date, we have several teachers that have donated their personal gifts and talents to assist in fulfilling

our PBS mission. These activities take place during the teachers' planning time, after school, and before school. Some of the activities include speech, ballroom dancing, playing the piano, disc jockeying, barbering, or even just jump roping or throwing a football.

It is our hope that next school year we can continue to set off other "light-bulbs" and discover other hidden talents from the very beginning of the school year. Have a great summer break everyone!

This year, a field trip was arranged for Homestead Middle Peer Leaders in Training, in which they were afforded a unique opportunity. The students, chosen for their commitment in upholding the tenets of the Full Value Contract, shared Project Adventure activities with the students participating in the E/BD program at Laura C. Sanders Elementary School. Naturally, the learning curve and enthusiasm grew exponentially with the older students leading the younger ones, who became more and more eager to participate in the fun.

As seen in the photo, the Homestead Middle School students engage in the activity called "Over, Under, and Through", a low elements exercise that takes place well into the year, when students trust levels have significantly developed.

Every year, Peer Leaders from South Dade Senior perform a socio-drama for the middle school students. The students meet after school with Ms. Katherine Meinecke, E/BD Clinician to develop and rehearse the skits, which usually are based on conflict resolution, and designed to guide students towards the right path, and make responsible choices. The Peer Leaders also share their personal testimonies of change, and the magnet and career certificate opportunities available at South Dade Senior. A yearly field trip is arranged by Ms. Katherine Meinecke, E/BD Clinician, and co-facilitated by Homestead Middle School teacher, Mr. Bryce Bishop, for the 8th grade students articulating to South Dade Senior High. Peer Leaders from South Dade join the students in touring the various academies available, such as Automotive, Culinary, Medical, Early Childhood, and Agriculture. The purpose of the field trip is to help familiarize students with the layout of the school, which can seem quite daunting.

WHAT IS SEDNET?



with Emotional/Behavioral Disabilities

The Multiagency Network for Students with Emotional/ Behavioral Disabilities, (SEDNET), was established to improve the provisions and coordination of education, mental health treatment and residential services for students identified with or at risk of emotional/behavioral disabilities. SEDNET Region 11/ creates and facilitates a network of key stakeholders committed to assisting in the provision of a quality system of care for

students in Miami-Dade and Monroe County Public Schools.

SEDNET can assist students and their families with the following:

Education Mental Health Substance Abuse Trauma Informed Care Juvenile Justice Child Welfare

Case Management services are provided to families and students, with at risk behaviors or with emotional/behavioral disabilities. Case Managers assist in coordinating services with schools in the integration of educational services, referrals for school based mental health evaluations and access to records from psychiatric hospitals and community mental health facilities. This unique program is the concept of Program Director, Wesley Frater, Director of Tournaments and is facilitated by NBA veteran and former Miami Heat community affairs liaison, Wali Jones. The powerful training empowers young people to be in leadership roles. The program seeks to create ALL-STAR parents and ALL-STAR students through neuro-linguistic programming. This Positive Peer Leadership Training encompasses parent team development,

student-athlete team development, individual development, and skill development in the following areas: Family, Self-Concept Self Esteem Communication, Decision Making, Problem Solving, Refusal Skills, Conflict Resolution, Academic Action Planning, and Career Exploration. Program activities and materials were well received by all students, many of whom expressed their intentions to go out and share what they learned with others.

During group counseling sessions the students were introduced to, and learned about, the Full Value ESP activity from Project Adventure. This fun activity provided the students with an opportunity to practice and enhance their communication skills with one another without talking. As the students have fun reaching consensus on which gestures to pick, they also learn to build a strong community together.

The students are engaged in numerous activities through the use of a variety of therapeutic games to assist them in reaching their full social/emotional potential. Through the use of the <u>Impulse Control Game</u>, students understand the benefits of impulse control and learn to evaluate alternatives before acting. In addition, they also learn about helping, sharing, and caring, as they play the aptly titled <u>Helping, Sharing and Caring Game</u>. This game is also helpful in strengthening self-esteem, improving communication skills, and fostering productive human relationships.
