

MIAMI PARK ELEMENTARY - DELAYED GRATIFICATION

The goal of delayed gratification is to teach self-control and responsibility to students participating in the E/BD program at Miami Park Elementary.

On a weekly basis, each student receives a ticket that is punched once for each of the five rules followed for a total of twenty five points. Students look forward to the end of the day to cash in their tickets. At the beginning of the school year, it was observed that the younger the student, the more difficult it was to delay their reward. This was the impetus for the a project to help all of the students manage control of their impulses for more successful outcomes. As the end of the school year approaches, we started a culminating project to demonstrate growth in their ability to delay gratification. Each student designed a bag to store their treasures to take home at the end of the day. Now, as they cash in their tickets at the end of the week, I watch in amazement at the changes they have demonstrated.



Students are free to take their bags home; but so far all bags are still here growing and awaiting the last day of school. It was originally hard for the students to claim their rewards at the end of the day, but now they are patiently awaiting the end of the school year.

NORTH COUNTY K-8 CENTER, SCOTT LAKE ELEMENTARY AND JOHN G. DUPUIS ELEMENTARY - CONNECTING PARENTS WITH TOOLS FOR SUCCESS

Parents at North County K-8 Center, Scott Lake Elementary, and John G. DuPuis Elementary participated in a Self Esteem Workshop and a Resource Fair. These energetic and committed parents learned the four main factors that are important for a child to develop and maintain high self-esteem. The four factors explained and discussed during the workshop were:

- * Positive Role Models to provide meaningful goals, values, ideals, and standards.
 - * Personal Strength that gives one the ability to influence life's circumstances.
- * Uniqueness and Individuality that provide a special personal sense of individual worth.
- * Sense of Connectivity and Belonging that foster satisfaction from associations that are significant.



In another opportunity to reach out to parents, I helped coordinate The Parent Academy to visit North County K-8 Center, Scott Lake Elementary, and John G. DuPuis Elementary. Mrs. Barbara Biggart from the Miami-Dade County Public School Parent Academy provided a wonderful seminar to our parents. Mrs. Biggart's seminar focused on the plasticity of the Brain; teaching parents that the brain is flexible and children can change and transform their inappropriate behavior into appropriate behaviors. In addition, Mrs. Biggart provided the parents with strategies to help optimal brain development and mitigate negative influences.

RICHMOND HEIGHTS MIDDLE - LARGE SCALE GROWTH

Ms. Leah Guzman, Clinical Art Therapist, works side-by-side with the students at Richmond Heights Middle School designing and painting large scale murals to increase academic engagement and raise school spirit. Mural making increases student self-esteem and problem solving skills. Mural making provides students with a creative outlet.

Last year Ms. Guzman and the students created a 60 foot mural titled, "Education is the Key to Success". The mural is located in the back of the school and includes a young boy who holds a key to unlock his potential. Ms. Guzman's intention is to empower the youth through imagery and words. The mural has text such as "reach for the stars" and symbolism such as music notes, flying books, and the earth with a keyhole to connect with the viewers. The painting not only beautifies, but also engages viewers to stop and think about the message. This year they are creating another large scale 48 foot mural in the front of the school. The new mural's message is "Values Matter." The mural includes animals for the school's Zoo Magnet program, Scales of Justice for the new law program, an abundant fruit basket, and, of course, the school board's initiative of values: respect, citizenship, cooperation, fairness, honesty, integrity, responsibility, kindness and the pursuit of excellence. The mural is playful and brings life to the walls of this institution.

MIAMI MACARTHUR SOUTH - PBS MAKES A DIFFERENCE!

Miami MacArthur South was recognized for the second consecutive year as a Positive Behavior Support (PBS) Gold Model school and again the only school in Miami-Dade County Public School district to receive the award during the 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 school years. This recognition demonstrates a decrease in outdoor suspensions, effectiveness though all the behavioral tiers, applying Response to Intervention for Behavior (RtI:B) data in the problem solving process, utilizing consistent and proactive strategies to prevent problem behavior, teaching appropriate behavior, and utilizing effective rewards and consequences with fidelity.

Students that are assigned to Miami MacArthur South due to expulsion from a traditional school setting easily adjust to a welcoming environment in which the focus on what a student is doing right is more important than what a student is doing wrong. Students, along with their parents, are oriented to our PBS expectations during the initial intake process. Students quickly learn the G.R.O.W.L school-wide behavioral expectations, an appropriate acronym for the school mascot, a tiger. The G.R.O.W.L expectations stands for **G**-Get in the Game, **R**-Respect Self and Other, **O**-Own your Choices, **W**-Work Hard and **L**-Learn to Lead. By learning and following the school-wide expectations, students earn 5 points per class per day. At the end of the week students that earned at least 80% of their points are rewarded with a special activity in the PBS Game Room. Students can also earn PBS Tiger Bucks for demonstrating positive behaviors in any area of the school. All teachers and staff can acknowledge positive behavior by rewarding students with a Tiger Buck as soon as a desired behavior is demonstrated to reinforce these behaviors. Students look forward to earning and saving their Tiger Bucks to use at the PBS Snack Store or the PBS Gift Shop! These weekly incentives encourage students to improve behaviors and feel their efforts are being recognized.

Faculty and staff buy-in for the PBS program is high as teachers and staff are recognized during faculty meetings for PBS fidelity implementation in the classroom, donations to the PBS Store, participation in the PBS activities, and attending PBS team meetings. Teachers are also treated to delicious treats in the Teacher's Lounge on Fridays for their enjoyment. Along with having teacher and faculty backing, we have community support through goods and monetary donations that help the PBS program to be rewarding and possible.

Even though working in alternative education can have its challenges, it's thanks to the support of teachers, administrators, and the community that Miami MacArthur South PBS program was able to achieve PBS Gold Model recognition two years in row.

Ms. Morrison was also recognized for her years of supervision and dedicated support to staff.

In the afternoon, attendees were treated to a thoroughly engaging session entitled "Work/Life Balancing: From Distress to Eustress" from Dr. Michael J. Alicea, Medical Social Worker from South Miami Hospital. Overall, the E/BD Joint meeting was truly a beneficial session for BMTs and Clinicians to join together to receive helpful updates on working together, review data to gain awareness and stay informed, receive insight and strategies to problem solve with solutions, and gain the opportunity to reflect on a great year in order to refresh and rejuvenate to work collaboratively again for the upcoming school year!

At Robert Renick, Art Therapy is offered in addition to traditional counseling to help students find an outlet for thoughts and feelings that interefere with their ability to focus on academic opportunities. During Art Therapy sessions, students use various materials such as paint, clay, wood, and



paper mache to create art pieces about feelings.

Students also learn to make positive independent decisions about how to handle their frustrations. This builds skills needed to help them successfully navigate their way in the classroom.


