The program began March 7th and ran for eight weeks. Students gather at Whispering Manes every Tuesday for two-hour sessions. During the sessions, students can participate in unmounted and mounted activities, all the while being supervised by certified professionals. The program's goal is to improve muscle strength, balance, gross and fine-motor skills, as well as communication skills. The program is also known for helping students achieve a sense of self-accomplishment and self-esteem.

The smiles on the faces of students speak to the incredible bond between humans and horses. It is a real joy to see the students' progress each week and utilize what they are learning.

PBIS AT PINECREST ACADEMY SOUTH CHARTER SCHOOL

Through our PBIS program, we create a positive school climate where students learn to behave properly by following the school-wide expectations of being safe, responsible, and respectful. In turn, students receive positive reinforcement which continues to motivate them to do the right thing. We teach values through PBIS lessons that enable students to demonstrate expected behaviors. Our "Pirate Expectations" are posted throughout the school building, which serves as a constant reminder.



We showcase positive behavior through positive referrals, morning "shout outs," and "Pirate of the Month" ceremonies, where parents are invited to hear all the wonderful ways in which their children are meeting and exceeding expectations. In addition, students earn "Pirate Loot" as a reward which can be redeemed for dress down days, lunch with the principal, various celebrations, and "buying" items from the treasure chests. Our staff is also rewarded for using the PBIS program with special lunches and treats in order to create a positive atmosphere all around the school.
