THERAPEUTIC GAMES - HELPING MOVE STUDENTS FORWARD ONE TURN AT A TIME







During group counseling, the students participating in the E/BD program at Scott Lake Elementary have fun as they are introduced to new therapeutic board games. These games help them learn many different concepts such as the importance of being patient and waiting their turn in order to win. The students are learning that patience is an important ingredient in their social life and is a key factor in academic success. As they play the *Wait and Win* board game, the students try a variety of fun tasks and try to solve problems effectively and successfully. Through the therapeutic use of this game, areas such as frustration tolerance, self-control, respect for others, and a sense of time and timing are addressed. The most important factor is that the students enjoy coming to counseling because they learn and have fun simultaneously.

The wonderful students who participate in the E/BD program at John G. DuPuis Elementary are learning about self-esteem through therapeutic games such as *I Can Do That* game and worksheet activities such as the *Self Esteem Tree Game*. The students are learning to differentiate between high self-esteem and a low self-esteem and discover their strengths and good personal qualities as group participants fill in the "fruits" on the tree with positive comments and things they like about themselves. As the students participate in these games, they learn they are capable to do anything they set their minds to as they discover that they do possess gifts, qualities, talents, and strengths.

ART THERAPY - LETTING THE ART REACH THE HEART





CHECK AND CONNECT

We are excited to have eight schools in Miami-Dade County currently trained and implementing Check and Connect through the support of Florida Gulf Coast University, the University of South Florida, and the State Personnel Development Grant (SPDG) from the U.S. Department of Education, OSEP. Check and Connect is a comprehensive student engagement intervention. It consists of school site staff working as mentors with a student mentee. PBS NEWS AT JESSE J. MCCRARY, JR. ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

The PBS program at Jesse J. McCrary is in full-swing again this year. In keeping with our Superhero theme, we held our PBS pep rally in early September where our PBS Team and Administrators reviewed the PBS/Dolphin Expectations, the Values Matter Program, and the new Attendance Arcade guidelines with students, teachers, and staff. Teachers will use their Dojo accounts to give students points for being Dolphin Expectation Superheroes when they are D-dedicated, O-organized, L-loving, P-prompt & present, H-honest, (have) I-integrity, N-noteworthy & S-safe. Students then may "cash-in" their Dojo points to attend the monthly PBS events, such as the Dolphin Depot store, held in September, and the annual Fall Festival, held in October.

Two new areas have been added to our PBS program this year. We have opened an Attendance Arcade at Jesse J. One of our classrooms is converted into a game room on the first Wednesday of each month. Students with perfect attendance for the previous month are allowed to come to the Attendance Arcade during their Special area time. Our PBS Team Leader, Ms. Foley, secured a Donors Choose donation for games, movies, and art activities to use in the arcade. Jesse J. also utilizes the Values Matter initiative daily. In addition to spotlighting the monthly Core Value each day on the announcements, the teachers receive the monthly newsletter and a lesson that relates to the current core value; students complete the activities when they are "caught" doing the right thing. We have created a Values Matters area in the media center where we can showcase these students, along with those who are nominated as the Core Value Student for each month. Students also receive shout-outs and Dojo points for exhibiting the core values and the Dolphin expectations.

HOMESTEAD MIDDLE SCHOOL - MEETING THE CHALLENGE



MIAMI SUNSET SENIOR - GOT SHARKS?

On Tuesday, December 1, 2015 I took my Senior class to complete step 1 of our shark tagging trip journey. The students took their swim test at A.D. Barnes Park with Coach David Diamond. My ultimate goal is to write a grant in order to provide the funding needed to take my students shark tagging with the University of Miami in May of 2016. The University of Miami conducts shark research by tagging different species of sharks and documenting their habits. The students will be broken up in teams of 5 and will each be assigned a job once a shark is hooked and brought up on the vessel. The team will work quickly to gather the data needed (such as the species, sex, length and girth), take a small piece of cartilage from the fin for testing, and attach the satellite tag on the fin. Then, the shark will be released.

Many of my students do not participate in Senior activities such as Homecoming, Prom, or Grad Night. Because of this, I want to do something special for them and give them an experience they will never forget. Additionally, this activity will help unite them with their peers in celebrating the accomplishment of graduating high school. This field trip will build social and team building skills, which are essential as they will be moving on into the real world.

As a bonus, Coach Diamond has graciously offered to take us kayaking in April. For now, we are focused on keeping ourselves in control of our emotions and earning good grades to ensure graduation. We look forward to a spectacular school year and plan to end it with a bang!
